Prashanti News

I was fortunate to spend a few precious weeks during July in Prashanti Nilayam. Swami, despite His physical health, was giving darshan everyday. During this short period, several significant events took place:

Publishers Conference on 19th & 20th July. Over 150 delegates from numerous countries came together to discuss how the International Sai Organisation can ensure that Swami's teachings are not diluted when promoted in the various languages around the world. The outcomes will be shared with Centres/Groups.

Concert by the Sqi Symphony Orchestra on 20th July.

The Sai Symphony Orchestra, comprising 59 musicians from 17 countries, performed a concert of Western Classical Music in the Divine Presence. The orchestra, led by Swiss conductor Klaus Maurer, prepared the programme in only five days. The members of the orchestra performed as a unified group, epitomising Bhagawan's message of 'Unity in Diversity'.

The one-hour programme opened with the *Marriage* of Figaro Overture by Austrian composer Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. The next selection was the last movement of Symphony No. 7 by the German composer Ludwig Van Beethoven. This work conveys determination, a strength that comes from unwavering faith in God. Next came the humorous *Italian in Algiers Overture* by Italian Giacomo Rossini.

Then the orchestra played two *Slavonic Dances* by Czech composer Antonin Dvorak. Another piece by Beethoven followed, this time the 4th movement of his *Symphony No.5*. This symphony expresses Beethoven's own struggle with adversity, and his ultimate victory as expressed in the 4th movement. The final work on the programme was the *Boda de Alonso* by Spanish composer Geronimo Jimenez.

At the conclusion of the concert, Swami was very happy and asked that the orchestra play more. The orchestra responded with a joyful and spirited repeat performance of the Jimenez Boda de Alonsa.

Swami showered the conductor with affection and materialised a chain for him.

Guru Purnima Celebrations on 21st July.

Swami's discourse emphasised how everyone has to face the consequences of his/her actions, that no one can escape the results of their actions. Ignoring this, we keep acting the way we like. Knowing what is good and bad, we still are not able to give up the bad. It is all of our own making.

The results of our actions are inevitable. In fact, the consequences can come back with ten fold intensity. The only way out of this cycle is to be the recipients of God's Grace. With God's Grace, the consequences can be reduced. For example, the medicine in a bottle will have its effect only before the expiry date, beyond which it ceases to make any impact. So too, God's Grace can postpone the Karmic consequences to a date after which, they will have no significant impact! With Divine Grace, any obstacle in life can be overcome. God has removed obstacles from the lives of so many devotees, but some people try to test Him. This is a mere waste of time. God will never yield to such tests.

Deserve God's Grace; all beings can escape the consequences of their actions by God's Grace. Whatever spiritual practice (sadhana) you may do, never forget God. Life is very important, even more than the human body. With prayer, you can sustain this life. Even a silent prayer will do.

God is in the heart of man. Life may come and go. Worldly difficulties will come and go. But never disconnect yourself from God. To deserve God's Grace, chant His Name and keep singing His Glory. 'All of you who have assembled here today have earned the highest profits. Retain it safely with you.'

Inter-Faith Conference – The Religion of Love on 22nd July. An interfaith conference was held with representatives from Islam, Buddhism, Christianity, Judaism and Hinduism to talk about love and peace as expressed in their religion. The first speaker was Maulana Wahid Uddin Khan – Islamic Scholar founder President of the Islamic Centre in Delhi. The theme of his talk was 'Islam and the Concept of Love & Peace'. He quoted many passages from the Koran and the Hadis to illustrate how Islam is a religion of Love. The second speaker was Dr. A. T. Aryaratna – founder of the Sarvodaya movement in Sri Lanka and former President of the World Parliament of Religions. He opined that the more you study religion in depth, the more you discover that it is nothing but Love.

The afternoon proceedings started at 4 pm. Representing Christianity was Father Henry Faren who expounds the universal tenets of Love of all religions on TV and radio. After Father Henry was Rabbi David Zeller for Judaism. The Rabbi wove several songs into his talk. The final speaker was P. S. J. Rama Shastrigal, Sanskrit pundit and scholar, Asthana Vidwan of Padhuga Trust Madurai and Asthana Vidwan of Rajarajeswari Alayam Ramnad Samsthanam. He spoke in Tamil, with a translator simultaneously translating his talk into English.

SPECIAL FEATURE National Teachers' Day 2005 'Make Me a True Reflection of You'

Sunday 17th July saw 150 SSE teachers, from around the UK, gathered to celebrate National Teachers' Day. The theme was 'Make Me a True Reflection of You'. The ambience of the venue, the altar, the table set up, the informative, exciting, interactive and fun topics covered was intended for us to really use the day to look within and take a step closer to becoming a 'true reflection' of our beloved Lord.

Region 7 Chair, Jey Sivaloganathan, was the dynamic compere for the day. After the rendition of the theme song, 'To You O Lord I Belong,' the thought-provoking, audio-visual expressions via Power Point presentations posed the question, 'What is education!'

Sharmila Parikh, National SSE Wing Co-ordinator introduced each Regional SSE Co-ordinator and extension members, who provided an update on the various National SSE projects. The musical interlude, provided by the Region 3 SSE School Orchestra, was an uplifting and inspirational moment.

Our quest speakers were Sister Jayanti, of the Brahma Kumaris, and Dr Upadhyay, a consultant ophthalmologist. Both spoke of their personal experiences and the early influences of their parents and grandparents who empowered them through their wisdom and love. They inculcated 'Love all, serve all'. Sister Jayanti spoke of the parents' role as the 'first teacher' by spending quality time with their children, telling them stories and feeding their minds. Keeping children occupied in many extracurricular activities such as music and sports keeps them focused on positive activities rather than the TV. By the practice of personal spiritual practices (sadhana), we grow stronger, calmer and are able to render loving service to others. Sister Jayanti concluded by quoting Sai Baba, 'Start the day with love, fill the day with love, end the day with love.

Dr Upadhyay spoke of teachers neither being born nor created but coming from within. Teachers and parents need to allow children to explore, question, seek answers, be creative and experience the beauty of God.

They need to listen to children and retell stories from the scriptures and from the lives of great men and women. He concluded by saying, 'You have become SSE teachers because of the past good deeds you have done to merit this. Swami has placed you in this position to not only speak His words of Truth (Sathya), Right Conduct (Dharma), Peace (Shanthi), Love (Prema) and Non-violence (Ahimsa) but to practice them'.

The interactive sessions in the afternoon provided an opportunity for networking, sharing ideas, creating origami, exploring teaching skills through demonstration and discussion, watching and participating in story telling activities through use of props & drama, all of which served to enhance the skills of those present and reflect within.

The multi-sensory, inspirational, memorable and, for some, a life-changing day concluded with another powerful slide presentation which showed that the essence of education is: 'To know the self in you is the same self in everyone.'
