Region 4 Birthday Celebrations

Sat. 19th Nov. 2005: '80 Years of Love in Action'

On a crisp and frosty morning, 1400 people gathered in the Ramgarhia Hall, Leicester, welcomed by the regalia of colour and reverberation. The first sight to greet them as they entered the main hall was a 3m by 3m image, suspended from the ceiling, of Swami with His open palms raised in a Blessing and reassurance to, 'Have no fear', (the 'abhayahasta mudra').

Anticipation filled the air, as groups of children with teachers, youths and adults gathered near the stage. A descending silence became a hum of bated breath.

Suddenly, Aums (pranava) reverberated throughout the hall and ignited the chanting of the Vedas, to lead the procession. The snaking youth proceeded with gusto, unfurling a parade of children and adults from the different Centres. Colour and costume with singing, moved alongside boards revealing the different stages of Swami's life from miracles to discourses, capturing the Divine quotes and depicting '80 years of Love in Action'. The procession uncoiled like a serpent, intertwining along paths around seated guests and finally disappearing to leave the hall in pin-drop silence. This was broken by melodious Devotional Songs, followed by a multimedia SSE drama based on the ten Avatars, which served the audience with a medley of choreography, music, and costumes depicting the Lord in different incarnations. Next came a superb serving of profound messages of Human Values by the children of the Sri Sathya Sai School of Leicester, who enchanted the audience with their sweetness, delivering precise playlets with a professional air. Swami's former students formed a panel to discuss the glory of Swami through personal experiences. This was followed by a Youth drama first performed in the Divine presence in the Sai Kulwant Hall in 2004, entitled 'Service is a Golden Opportunity to Mankind'.

Soon, a medley of songs energised the audience and melted into a musical performance preparing the children to gather around the numerous Birthday cakes baked by all the Centres. Balloons and a cacophony of party poppers joined the Birthday song. Soon children from each Centre were performing Aarthi. SPECIAL CHRISTMAS FEATURE Extracts from Swami's Christmas Day Discourses

In order to illumine the path and help him (man) overcome these troubles, sages, seers, realised souls, divine personalities and incarnations of God take birth in human form. They move among the afflicted and the seekers who have lost their way or strayed into the desert, and lead them into confidence and courage. Certain personalities are born and live out their days for this very purpose. They can be called 'born for a purpose' (karana-janmas) for they take on a birth (janma) for a cause or purpose (karana).

Jesus was a *karana-janma*, a Master born with a purpose, the mission of restoring love, charity and compassion in the heart of man. He had no attachment to the self, nor paid any heed to joy or sorrow, loss or gain. He had a heart that responded to the call of anguish, and he went about the land preaching the lesson of love. His life was a libation for the upliftment of humanity. Like most seekers, he first searched for the Divine in the objective world. But he soon realised that the world is a kaleidoscopic picture created by one's own imagination, and sought to find God within himself. His stay in the Himalayan monasteries in Kashmir and in other centres of Eastern asceticism and philosophical inquiry, gave him greater awareness...

Jesus' original name was Isa which, when repeated, is Sai. *Isa* and *Sai*, both mean God (*Ishwara*), the Eternal Absolute, the 'Being-Awareness-Bliss' (sath-chitananda). In the Tibetan manuscript, at the monastery where Isa spent some years, his name is written as 'Isha', which means the Lord of all living beings. When Jesus proclaimed that he was the Messenger of God, he wanted to emphasise that every one is a messenger of God and has to speak, act and think like one. This is the true branch dealing with action and its reaction (karma-kanda) of the ancient truth (the Vedas): The spiritual discipline (sadhana) of work (karma), prayer (japa), service (seva) and meditation (dhyana). When progress is furthered, Jesus asserted, each one can recognise all as sons of God, children of God, brothers and sisters of oneself and, so, deserving of worship. The branch of the *Vedas* dealing with contemplation (upasana kanda) is the scripture in the eternal universal religion (sanathana dharma) for this stage. Finally, knowledge ripens into wisdom and the goal of spiritual wisdom (*jnana kanda*), another branch of the *Vedas*, is



reached when each one realises, "I and my Father are one." **Sri Sathya Sai Baba, 1978**

Christ declared that God could be realised only through love. Once a high priest in Jerusalem called Jesus and asked him: "Are you King of the Jews?" Jesus replied: "I do not say so." The priest told Jesus: "You are leading the people astray by your wrong teachings. You are telling them that everyone can enter Heaven only through you." Jesus said that he had been telling the people to seek the Kingdom of Heaven. The priest asked: "Where is that Kingdom?" Jesus replied: "The Kingdom of Heaven is within you, within everybody. When this is my teaching, how can I be accused of claiming that the Kingdom of Heaven can be attained only through me?" How did Jesus get the courage to speak in this fashion? It was because he was proclaiming the truth. Truth is born of love, which comes from faith in God. Sri Sathva Sai Baba, 1987

There is a custom of putting up a Christmas tree on this day and worshipping it. The genesis of this custom can be traced to Germany. A preacher by name of Jensen from England once visited Germany. When he was travelling in Germany on his mission, he noticed some Germans attempting to offer a child's life as sacrifice to propitiate God who, they believed, lived in an oak tree. The priest was worried and questioned them why they were offering an innocent child as sacrifice to a tree. As they asserted that God lived in the tree, he took an axe and cut the tree. To his surprise, an inexplicable vibration from head to foot shook him. He noticed the form of a child between the two portions of the tree that was cut by him. This incident teaches the truth that God lives not only in human beings but also in plants and trees. From that time onwards people started putting up a Christmas tree and worshipping it on this Christmas day. The system of worshipping Divinity in many forms including plants and stones, which originated in Bharath, has been prevalent for a long time in other countries also.
