Here is a little about them both:

Samuel Sandweiss MD has been a practicing psychiatrist for over 40 years and is currently living in San Diego, California USA. He has been a Medical Director of a psychiatric clinic and has taught at the University of California San Diego School of Medicine in the position of Assistant Clinical Professor in the Department of Psychiatry.

He has written three books about Sathya Sai Baba, 'Sai Baba: The Holyman and the Psychiatrist', 'Spirit And The Mind', and the recently published 'With Love, Man is God'. He has served on the Sathya Sai Baba Council of the United States since its beginning in 1975. Dr. Sandweiss has been interested in the relationship of spirituality and psychiatry and how spiritual practices affect the mind and expand consciousness and love.

Sharon Sandweiss has been a high school teacher and has been an advisor/coordinator for the Sathya Sai Young Adult Program in their region. She was editor of Sai World Newsletter, a newsletter for Sai children ages 6-13.

Dr. Sandweiss and his wife Sharon, have hosted a Sai Baba Centre for over 35 years and they oversee Birth Day Publishing Company, which publishes books about Sai Baba by Western authors. They have a lovely family of four daughters who have had wonderful experiences with Swami. 

Shitu Chudasama, UK National Vice Chair spoke on how youth and children should not worry and should surrender all of their problems at the Lotus feet of Bhagavan. He spoke further about the similarities between Jesus and Swami.

The programme then concluded with devotional singing and Arathi.

Father Christmas paid the children a special visit, bearing gifts of chocolate. Maha Prasadam was served to conclude the celebrations.

Region 6 Christmas Meeting

On the 14th December at Chapel Hall I attended the Region 6 Christmas meeting hosted by Reading Centre. The afternoon started with the Gayathri mantra and 'Thought for the day'.

Bala Balaraman, a former National Chair, who has, for a long time, been working in an interfaith capacity, spoke to us on the subject of 'Jesus, from an oriental point of view'. He talked about his youth in Sri Lanka and how all the edges of the various religions merged, with many attending each other's festivals. He spoke of how Sri Ramakrishna found enlightenment through Hinduism, Islam and Christianity and declared that there was no difference - all paths lead to God.

The expansion that Swami talks about is that we will be able to accept all truths even those that differ from our own. Our special gift from Swami is that we know that all paths go to the divine.

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We were told that when Swami Vivekananda looked for clarification of his own scripture he could understand it better through the scriptures of other faiths. Sai Baba demonstrates to us to celebrate all festivals. He says, "I have not come here to start any new religion, if you are a Hindu be a better Hindu, if a Christian, be a better Christian, if a Muslim be a better Muslim."

Masters cross all boundaries. At the Ramakrishna Centre they have pictures of Jesus and Krishna, they synthesise both cultures. Bede Griffiths who wanted to introduce Christian teaching in India introduced them in a Hindu context so as to be better understood.

We next participated in one of Reading's annual Christmas events, 'The Light Spiral'; this consisted of fir branches covering half the floor of the hall, all facing towards the centre, lit candle, slightly elevated represented the Divine. In the darkened hall with a film of Sai Baba running and carols softly playing and in a quiet and meditative atmosphere we each walked around the spiral placing our lit candles either side of the branches. Finally under the loving gaze of two large pictures of Jesus and Sai Baba the spiral was fully lit, illuminated from the centre candle to the feet of Baba, from the 'I' to the 'I'. Devotional songs ended the Christmas meeting that was so simple yet so powerful. Thanks to the Reading members who created such a poignant and memorable afternoon.

Region 7 Ladies Day and Swami's 83rd Birthday Celebrations

On 22nd November, Region 7 celebrated Ladies Day in the morning and Swami's very special 'One Thousand Moons' 83rd Birthday in the afternoon. The venue was Patchway High School, Bristol where the Regional SSE School is based.

The theme for the Ladies Day Celebrations was "Sathwic Diet - Intake Through Our Five Senses" and as it is the ladies who normally cook, keep the homes clean, and monitor the environment, and look after the needs of the family in most homes – it was felt this was an important subject. Swami says: people think that sathwic diet consists of milk, curd and other things. We must try to know the real nature of sathwic food. Sathwic diet does not mean simply the food we take through our mouth, which is only one among our five senses, but also means the pure air we breathe, the pure vision we see through our eyes, the pure sound we listen to and pure objects we touch through our feel. All that we take in through the doors of the five senses may be described as the sathwic diet. All the five senses must be pure and immaculate. Then, we must endeavour to gain mastery over our senses."

The morning session began at 10.30 am with beautiful mantras and devotional songs all led by ladies who all sang beautifully. This was followed by a wonderful welcome song by the SSE Nursery children who brought a smile to everyone's face!

This was followed by an extremely interesting talk by Rosemary Perry, UK National Chair who had kindly travelled a long way to attend this event. She spoke on the importance of using our five senses properly and most importantly the importance of Sathvic thoughts.

This was followed by a powerful play by group 2 SSE children which portrayed lifestyles between two young girls – one leading a Sathvic life and another a completely non-Sathvic lifestyle (as most teenagers do these days!) and the consequences. The play very nicely led up to a very informative talk by Manavta Group – which promotes Sathvic Lifestyles. We were all deeply affected by this talk and felt each of us needs to make some adjustments and lifestyle changes to lead a more Sathvic life as Bhagwan so often tells us to do.

The morning session ended with a wonderful and energizing unison devotional song.

After a hearty and most delicious lunch everyone re-convened to celebrate our beloved Bhagawan's 83rd Birthday. The theme for the afternoon was "How to win the Grace of God". The afternoon started with Vedic chanting and beautiful devotional songs by Zita and Co (Anahata). Rosemary Perry spoke most movingly in the afternoon about her own personal life and how in all aspects of her life she had witnessed the "Grace of God". Everyone in the audience, both young and old was extremely moved by Rosemary's heartwarming and moving talk.

This was followed by a play by Group 1 SSE who portrayed the life of Vibhishana (Ravana's brother) who led a Sathvic life. There was then a presentation by Regional youth who had been on Pilgrimage (Sadhana Group) with Brother Ajit Popat. The youth using a wonderful PowerPoint presentation explained in detail their preparations before the pilgrimage, their wonderful experiences whilst in the presence of Swami and the personal changes they experienced on their return.

Sathya Sai School Leicester A Celebration of Light

'Celebration of Light' was the theme of this annual function at our Sathya Sai School Leicester on the evening of Saturday, 20th

December 2008. It began with a beautiful and warm welcome with school prayers by the children. They then announced that in line with the theme of the evening they would be looking at seven world festivals of light. Overall, the evening lasted for two and half hours and it thrilled the audience with plays, songs, musical items and children's personal thoughts that provided deeper insights into the light festivals celebrated in different cultures and traditions and their link to human values. In between these were speeches from two key guest speakers: the Lady Lord Mayor of Leicester Mrs Manjula Sood and the Director of European Sathya Sai Education Institute, Dr Thorbjoern Meyer. The feedback received from the audience was nothing but positive, it was described as 'a superb evening, brilliantly performed by the children and it was wonderful to see children in beautiful costumes!' Above all it was the confidence shown by the children that became the key remark from those who joined the celebration.

The Evening Programme

The first item was a play about the festival of Santa Lucia, which told the story of Saint Lucy who gave up her life of luxury to serve her lord, Jesus Christ. She helped the poor and needy and demonstrated through her life that 'Duty is God and Work is Worship'. This play was accompanied with beautiful singing from the older girls who also compèred it.

Next was the African American celebration of *Kwanza*: which stands for seven values that contribute to building and reinforcing family, community and culture. Acting was accompanied by beautiful singing of an African song, to traditional African music.

The special quest of the celebration, the Lord Mayor of Leicester, Mrs Manjula Sood, then gave an honest and heartfelt speech and congratulated the school on its great achievements and successes to date. remembered how the School had begun with only 7 children and despite facing many challenges; the school has grown and has progressed into a full primary and part secondary school. 'It gives me great pleasure to be amongst you this evening. By simply looking at the children's performance and the way they conduct themselves, I can safely say that the Sathya Sai Education in Human Values programme based upon Love, Peace, Truth, Righteousness and Non-Violence has certainly had a transformative effect upon these young children'. Furthermore she invited the children to perform at the opening ceremony of the Special Olympics GB National Summer Games, which are to be held

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between 25th and 31st July 2009 in the city of Leicester. These games are held every four years for people with learning disability – the last event was held in 2005 in Glasgow when some 8000 athletes took part.

The second guest speaker was Dr Thorbjoern Meyer (the Chair of Zone 7 of the international Sri Sathya Sai Service Organisation in Europe, a member of the Prashanti Council and a member of the International Committee of Sathya Education). He spoke about the importance of light and illustrated how it shines in all of us. He further narrated a story about how a dying sect of Christian monks was helped by a wise Jewish Rabbi. The story brilliantly illustrated how faith in oneself and unity among the sect helped to attract a younger generation of followers and ensured that the faith could be sustained for generations.

Following this the audience was treated to an excellent display of physical discipline and agility with a demonstration of Shorin-ryu Karate, with yellow, blue and purple belt students of the School. Then the older children showed the meaning behind the celebration of Wesak, which is a Buddhist festival. It showed how the Buddha became enlightened and taught us that all attachments are illusory and transitory and lead us away from the real purpose of life.

Celebration of light within the context of *Christmas* came next with our delightful little angels from the foundation stage classes of Love & Joy. It was lovely to see them perform and exude confidence as they spread their light, in line with Jesus' message, 'I am the light of the world. If you follow me you won't be stumbling through the darkness, because you will have the light that leads to life.'

Celebration of the Hindu festival of light, known as *Divali*, then followed from a different view. Here the children retold the story, as town's people of Ayodhya, of how Bharat was prepared to die if Rama was even a day late in returning to the throne. The girls from years 5, 6, 7 and 8 did an exquisite dance. The key message was that Rama was the light of Ayodhya and we too can let our lights shine by being as he was and by following the righteous path throughput our life.

Mrs Usha Lim, the head teacher then gave a summary of the latest Ofsted report, based on the School inspection that took place during the week of 2nd December 2008. Then, the children from years 3 and 4 enacted the story of the Jewish light festival *Hanukkah*. This eight day festival is

celebrated to remember how an oil lamp stayed lit for 8 days without oil and how the eternal flame continued to be lit forever to remind us that God is with us forever, that he is ever present and he will always protect us. Then the audience were taken to Thailand for the festival of *Loi Kratong*, celebrating joy and happiness by lighting lamps called 'Kratongs'. The older girls looked very elegant and full of eastern promise in their Thai costumes. The play concluded with a lovely dance with the 'Kratongs'. The significance of light in Islam is in the symbol of the religion itself, the crescent moon and star. The girls sang 'Let my heart reflect thy light Lord, as the moon reflects the light of the sun....'. In Sikhism Divali is also celebrated, as the 10th Guru was released from prison on this day.

The older boys danced on the stage in true Bhangra style and the audience spirit was lifted even higher.

As part of the finale all the children and staff of the School assembled on stage to sing 'We are the world'. Several children took on solo singing to the delight of the audience and also sang to the chorus in such a way that the whole hall reverberated with the feeling of oneness and unity among different cultures.

I would like to thank all the friends and supporters of the school, and especially the two Sai Centres of Leicester: the Narborough Centre and the Leicester Central Centre for providing a healthy yet sumptuous meal to end the evening! Remembrance - Dr Padmanabhan

Our condolences to all his family.

Dr Padmanabhan, the steadfast and staunch devotee who, for so many years, used to walk behind Swami during Darshan, passed away recently. His family was one of the first families of Bangalore to recognise and follow Swami when he proclaimed his divinity at the tender age of 14. Dr Padmanabhan was the father of two dear friends of the SSSSO UK, Geeta Ram (who blessed us with a series of talks around the UK in July 2005) and Dr. Prithvi Raval (who was our guest speaker at the 2008 National Spiritual Day). The final ceremonies were to be performed on 5th January 2009. It was wonderful that all the family were brought together to India from different parts of the world and that Dr. Padmanabhan passed away when all were present. Prithvi had prayed that he would be able to hold his father's hand when he passed away – and this too happened.
